2018 Meeting Minutes April 27 & 28, 2018

Due to internet bandwidth issues, the ability to transcribe collective minutes was inhibited. Break out sessions for specific issues were managed using specific administrator groups. Four topics were addressed using this process: Knowledge Bowl, Drama Festival, Middle School Sports Festival and other requests from the Athletic Directors. Discussions related to the issues of hosting unified AASCA events were completed with input from the entire group.

After the break out sessions were completed, presentations of the findings from those sessions were presented, briefly discussed and approved. These handbook addendums are located at the end of this document.

AASCA Small and Large School Letter Review from ADs

EIS: AASCA Volleyball positive experience....kids enjoyed....EIS wants at least one unified tournament.

AST: Long term conversation....first...unified but only one attempt..and that was lasting for 10 years...logistical concerns...how many games played? Purpose is interaction...students all together..and that is a positive..but small schools may be intimidated.

CISS: Small school participation is hindered by large tournaments...large school logistics of students interacting is lost with multiple venues...prefer to return to separate tournaments

CIG: Issue of small schools participating inhibits the separation. Logistics of small schools hosting is problematic.

BALBOA: Change of AD has inhibited school's participation.

CIG: Determined that each country can host volleyball and that may still be unified. But soccer and basketball should return to separate tournaments.

PANAMERICAN SCHOOL: Schools have trouble with flights and other logistical tournament problems....

CISS: Food lines and hotel accomodations were problems at volleyball.

Village will send updated numbers of enrollment

VOTE: General sentiment among schools was the AD's are the experts in this area and should be trusted regarding this matter. AD's presented a compelling case outlining the need to separate some tournaments due to logistical challenges of hosting such large events.



Large majority (only 5 no votes) of schools voted to accept the AD proposal regarding the organization of AASCA tournaments. Basketball, Soccer, and Volleyball will be separate events, all other AASCA events (Leadership, Knowledge Bowl, Science Fair, Track and Field will remain unified). One exception to the AD proposal was that Balboa, DCIS, Freedom should be added to Red group.

Community Service Projects: LIA of Nicaragua: ANDL Diabetic children assistance/unanimous vote to receive AASCA award.

Please see the highlighted information at the end of the AASCA Science Fair Event Report. This was not noticed until after the meeting was adjourned.

Other Topics of Concern:

- 1. Eligibility of students on scholarship who participate in AASCA events: What can be done to insure fair expectations of participation? Discussion revolved around various criteria at schools: discipline/academic/other. General consensus was that this is an area of concern without any means of enforcement and an issue to be addressed by General Directors.
- 2. Creating a sportsmanship team with one student per school instead of school award. Give an award of model students per school. This proposal received full support from principals for providing another non competitive aspect to AASCA events. Sportsmanship is celebrated and honored among all participants/schools.0
- 3. Flag of Panama needs to be corrected on AASCA documents to correct position. Apparently the flag is displayed upside down with the star on the wrong corner.
- 4. AASCA online needs to be updated

- o b. High School Principals and Directors Meetings. Consequences: failure to comply with the attendance policy will result in suspension from all AASCA student events and activities for the following school year.
- § This needs to be cleared up and who enforces it?
- § 8 ADs did not attend the AD conference in January. Are their schools out for next year?
- Fees payment. Each school pays the fees by transfer. The paying school must assume the transfer fees.
- o This needs to be added to the AASCA Events Manual in section. 2.2. Many schools are still paying by check and not all banks are accepting the checks or charging as much as \$200 to deposit them.

- Hudak Hendrix/Alan Walls EAS have agreed to edit the AASCA manual and cleanup the grammatical errors as well as provide minor updates.. For example: Section 3 mentions "fax numbers" as well as others examples listed below:
- · Chapter 1.
- o 2.2 See above.
- o 4.1 and 4.2 have the same text.
- o 4.3 mentions "snacks and soft drinks." Should it be a proper dinner? It is a travel day and the kids are hungry. Also, the night before the first day of competition. If it is just a snack, after the opening ceremony (late) the teams have to go looking for a place still open to eat a full dinner. Not always available.
- o 4.4 Opening and closing ceremonies will be conducted in English (Approved last year but expectation has not been followed)



o 5.1 Medical Assistance. This needs to be taken out as the host schools are no longer responsible to pay. All schools pay their own hospital/medical bills either by cash/school CC or via their insurance coverage.

- Chapter 2
- o 1.1 "7 to 11 teams." Should say 8 to 11 teams...
- o 1.5 Game Schedule and Playing Format: we submitted new formats and criteria (point 8 of the AD meeting minutes) that is much more detailed for less than 4 teams to 24 teams in the case that the unified tournaments continued. These formats would replace the current ones in the manual. Not an issue for discussion by the principals nor the GDs as it is a technical issue that should be left up to the ADs.
- o 1.10.5 Protests: copies of the form should be available on site as well as at least one copy be included in the event manual given out at the coaches/AD meeting.
- o 1.11.1 bullet point 5: why is there a designation between big and small school divisions? Should be the same.
- o 3. Basketball 3.7: Is it 20 points or 30 points? The info in the paragraph is repeated again in the bullets. Redundant.

^{**} It is recommended to schedule MSSF sometime during the first semester in order not to overload the second semester with sports activities.



Unified tournaments started in the cycle 2017-2018. Before that there were small and large tournaments for basketball, volleyball and soccer played separately and an invitational tournament for each sport every third year.

Each tournament (official or invitational) had its own number since the year they first started.

From now on all the tournaments will be called with a number without specifying official or invitational. For example, the volleyball tournament played on April 3-7 was number 27.

INAUGURATION CEREMONIES

They should last 45 minutes maximum including the parade.

HEAD OF GROUPS

Starting next school year (2019/2020), the organizing committee for the soccer, basketball and volleyball tournaments will form as many groups as necessary placing as head of groups the best teams from the previous year and the host teams. Details are provided below:

GROUPING

- 1. There will be as many bowls as number of groups necessary to accommodate all the participating teams
- 2. Distribution of bowls will be as follow:
 - Bowl # 1. Group heads: the best ranked teams from the previous tournament + the host school.
 - Bowl # 2. The best ranked schools from 6th to 10th from the previous tournament.
 - Bowl # 3. The best ranked schools from 11th to 15th from the previous tournament.
 - Bowl # 4. The best ranked schools from 16th to 20th from the previous tournament. Any school (team) that had not participated in the previous tournaments will be included in bowl # 4 automatically.
 - Bowl # 5. This Bombo will contain letters from "A" till necessary, as many as the number of groups needed.
 - Bowl # 6. This bowl will contain numbers from 1 till necessary, as many as the number of schools per group needed.
- 3. All the bowls will be empty assigning each institution to each of the groups.
- 4. All the balls will be taken out from each bowl before proceeding to the next one.
- 5. According to the standard procedure, firstly a ball will be taken out from the schools' bowl and after that a ball will be taken out from the group's bowl in order to assign the order in which games will be played.
- 6. In bowl # 1, the host school will be assigned position A1, the rest of the schools of bowl # 1 will go automatically to position 1 of each group while from bowls 2, 3 & 4 in random manner institutions will be drawn to complete the groups.
- 7. In alignment with AASCA rules no group should have two teams from the same country; though there is a chance that this condition is not met all the time due to the number of participants from different countries.




- 8. The distribution of schools to groups according to the criteria of their country may mean that a school needs to be excluded from one group (and skipped to the next group) if another team from their country is already in that group.
- 9. If a group is skipped due to the geographical rule, the committee will return to that group to continue the draw.

USING TECHNOLOGY IN TRACK & FIELD AND CROSS COUNTRY EVENTS (Pilot for 2019/2020)

 In 2019-2020, besides the photo finish technology which has been used over the years, AASCA track & field and Cross country events will use additional cameras to help referees in controversial situations.








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AASCA SPORTS EVENTS OF 2018-2019

The AD who hosted tournaments gave a brief report of their tournaments.

Manuel Mancia, Basketball at LCR in October 2018.

- A colorful inauguration ceremony though it took more than an hour.
- The games took places at LCR courts (3) and in a gym nearby LCR.
- Good food during the closing ceremony.
- Some parents as spectators were quite disrespectful even to players.
- Try to get the stats faster. Using an App was a suggestion.

Alan Walls, Track & Field at EAS in November 2018.

- Both the track & field events and cross country events took place at EAS.
- In weeks prior to the tournament, there were some concerns from a couple of schools about including students in grades 6 and besides that some of them were not 12 years old by the first day of competition. This issue has been discussed in this Meeting.
- This very demanding tournament was professionally managed before, during and after the tournament.
- Concerns arose about some events taking place during dark hours.

Matt MacInnes, Soccer at ISP in February 2019.

- It was the first AASCA tournament hosted by Mr. MacInnes. He consulted all the time with the AD Board which helped him a lot to avoid mistakes.
- The majority of the fields were in excellent conditions.
- The stats were always timely delivered.
- The tournament received lots of positive comments
- There was a recommendation that for the future, anytime, anywhere where placing tents, they must be anchored properly. There were a couple of times that tents at La Hacienda fields flew away from their places. Fortunately, there were no accidents reported due to this situation.

Andres Leon, MSSF at PAS in March 2019

- This is the second time Mr. Leon hosts this MSSF.
- ADs who have attended MSSFs several times, coincide that this a wonderful Festival which is totally different than any other AASCA event in which winning is one of the main goals. In MSSFs making friends, having fun and cultivating sportsmanship has been and will continue being the first priority.
- Mr. Leon thinks that it will help a lot if participants send in advance the students jerseys' sizes.
- He also reinforces the idea that ADs in their registration process should include the positions athletes play the better. That will help enormously when forming the tournament tribes.



Fernando Martinez, Tennis at DCS in March 2019

- 6 schools
- 50 athletes
- 5 courts
- Inauguration and closing ceremonies were short
- Technical meeting, short and clear
- One monitor per court that allowed the matches to be fast and on time.
- New tennis balls were used for every match.
- Copa Davis format
- ADs think that charging \$900 per school regardless the number of teams/students per school is not right. The suggestion to be approved by DGs is \$300 if one team, \$600 if two teams, if three or four teams: \$900.

Jose Figueroa, Swimming at CAG in March 2019

- 10 schools
- 121 participants
- The event took place fully at CAG
- ADs present commented that allowing this tournament to take place in three days was a good decision instead of two days as it has been since ever.
- Other comments were: the officials' job was very professional, touchpads was a great plus, livestreaming fantastic, chapin hospitality was great.

MSSF REGISTRATION FEE

The MSSF registration fee which is \$ 700 per team should be included in the AASCA Manual.

MEDICAL ASSISTANCE

Update the AASCA Manual with this statement to be in alignment with what DGs approved in their 2015-2016 Meeting.

"It is required that all AASCA sports events participants are covered by medical or accident insurance. An emergency fund is also recommended for traveling teams.

Accident and Sickness Insurance is mandatory for all AASCA events".

GOLD, SILVER AND BRONZE DIVISIONS AWARDS

Gold division: 1st to 4th place banners



Silver division: 5th to 8th place banners Bronze division: 9th to 11th place banners

Medals will be given only to teams who finalize 1st to 3rd place.

Banner for the 4th place of the gold division will say "GOLD DIVISION OUTSTANDING PARTICIPATION"

Banner for the 5th, 6th and 7th place will say: 1st place silver division, 2nd place silver division and 3rd place silver division, respectively.

8th place banner will say "SILVER DIVISION OUTSTANDING PARTICIPATION"

Banners for the 9th, 10th and 11th place will say: 1st place bronze division, 2nd place bronze division, 3rd place bronze division, respectively.

In case of tournaments with less than 16 teams only gold and silver division will receive a banner.

14 TEAMS FORMAT

4 groups of 3, 3, 4 and 4. Top 2 teams in each group advance to an 8-team tournament. Quarterfinals, semifinals and finals for places 1-8. The other 6 teams play in a 6-team tournament (8-team tournament format). The third place teams from the two groups of 4 receive a bye to the semifinals. Quarterfinals, semifinals and finals for places 9-14. 4-6 games each team. 37 games total.

YELLOW CARDS IN SOCCER

Three yellow cards in different matches will lead to suspension of the following match. No amnesty. Two yellow cards in the same match will lead to suspension of the following match.

EXTRA WATER BREAK FOR HYDRATION IN SOCCER

The rule of having a mandatory 2 minutes break at the 15th and 45th minutes in games between 10 am and 2 pm still stands.

If both teams agree and depending on the weather conditions, a two - minutes water break can be also authorized in games played earlier than 10 am or later than 2 pm.

In any case, those two minutes will have to be added at the end of the half.

CLARIFICATION ON STUDENTS AGES

To avoid confusions or misunderstanding, when referring to a category that allows students below an age for instance U19, meaning students who do not reach the 20, from now on AASCA will call it 19-U which means 19 years old and under. 14-U means 14 years old and under.

NEW RULES APPROVED BY INTERNATIONAL ORGANIZATIONS



AASCA sports tournaments will apply any rule approved by International Federations before September of that same school year.

OFFICIALS IN BASKETBALL AND VOLLEYBALL MATCHES

- a) Basketball: Two refs on the court, two on the table. All the tournament matches.
- b) Volleyball. Three refs in the classifying stage and 5 in the championship matches.

SWIMMING AND TRACK & FIELD AASCA TOURNAMENTS

ADs hereby ask DGs to go over the proposal for the new swimming and track and field sections below.

This was discussed in details during the meeting and it was passed unanimously.

If approved by DGs, the new sections will be in place starting 2019/2020.

For soccer, volleyball and basketball, it will remain the same, as it has been since AASCA was founded: only students in grade 7th and up are able to compete.

SECTION 5: TRACK & FIELD/CROSS-COUNTRY

- The tournament will submit to AASCA and International Association of Athletics Federation (IAAF) rules.
- Cross-country (CC) is an event of the track and field AASCA Tournament.
- The AASCA Track and Field Tournament organizing committee will solve issues not specified in this manual.

5.1. Participants and Divisions

Eligibility:

Athletes in 6th grade, from 11 years old (Must be 11 on the first day of the Tournament) up to 12th grade, 19 years old (Must be younger than 20 on the first day of the Tournament). Age will be determined on the first day of the Tournament.

- Divisions:
 - 14 years old and younger boys (11 to 14 years old).
 - 14 years old and younger girls (11 to 14 years old).
 - 19 years old and younger boys (15 to 19 years old).
 - 19 years old and younger girls (15 to 19 years old).

5.2. Number of Athletes and Entry Fees



- Track & Field (including CC): Each team may register a maximum of 15 athletes per Division. (Total 60 athletes per School)
- Individual Entry Fee: US\$70 per athlete (If a school enters five or less athletes in the same division Individual Entry Fee per athlete is paid).
- Division Entry Fee: US\$400. (If a school enters six or more athletes in the same Division Division Entry Fee is paid).
- Schools can compete with a mixed (co-ed) team; however, they will compete within the boys division and will not score.
- Each participant will be able to participate in maximum five individual events (track and field and/or cross-country) and in two relays.

5.3. Team Awards

- Boys 14 and younger Division Champion, Second Place, Third Place.
- Girls 14 and younger Division Champion, Second Place, Third Place.
- Boys 19 and younger Division Champion, Second Place, Third Place.
- Girls 19 and younger Division Champion, Second Place, Third Place.

5.4. Scoring to Determine Overall Team Placing

- Each athlete/relay will score points according to the table below.
- The school who accumulates the highest score in a particular division will be the champion in this Division. There will be a team champion / runner-up / third place for each Division.

5.5. Events, Location, Competition Manual

- The length of AASCA running tracks shall be 400 meters and the venues where the Tournament takes place must comply with the minimum IAAF standards.
- For the cross-country events, the host school will make every effort to provide the best possible quality course. The minimum length of the course must be one kilometer and the trail must be at least 3 meters wide, clearly marked. The starting area should be wide enough to guarantee a safe start for all participants and for the equipment installation. For more information regarding the CC course, please refer to the Article 250 of the IAAF manual.



• The host will be responsible for elaborating the Tournament Manual and schedule of activities, renting of quality competition venues.

5.6. Cross Country Events

- Three types of races will take place: individual, co-ed race (3 girls and 3 boys), and relays (four athletes per team).
- In the relay races, schools can enter only one team.

Individual Races

 All the runners of the same Division compete at the same time. The girls run 2K for 14 and younger and 3K for 19 and younger divisions, while the boys run 3K for 14 and younger and 4K for 19 and younger divisions.

4 x 1000 Relays

- Each runner will run 1K.
- Athletes will carry a baton, which will be passed on from one runner to another in the exchange zone (20 meters).

6 x 1000 Co-ed Relays

- Each team will be formed by 3 boys and 3 girls.
- Each runner will run 1K
- Each team's coach or delegate will determine the relay legs' order.
- Athletes will carry a baton, which will be passed on from one runner to another in the exchange zone (20 meters).
- The mixed relay will be for medals only, not for points.

5.7. Track and Field Events

- Each school can enter a maximum of four athletes in the same event of the same Division.
- In the relay races, schools can enter only one team.

5.8. Rosters

- Prior to the technical meeting, the organizing committee will provide to each participating school the athletes' rosters including: competitor's number, birthday, grade level, events to participate, coaches, administrator and other members of the delegation. Everything will be checked and upon the technical meeting's ending, confirmation is expected (or notification of changes).
- Once the competition is underway, only athletes' withdrawals (scratches) are accepted. Adding athletes or events will not be permitted.

5.9. Uniforms

 Each athlete will wear school team's uniform in accordance with the uniform policy of AASCA and IAAF.

5.10. Timing System

- Cross-country and Track and Field competitions must use photo finish in order to provide reliable results timely and accurately.
- Stopwatches will be used as back up.

5.11. Call Room Arrival Time

- All athletes are required to report to the call room prior to their event wearing the approved school uniform/number.
- Before entering the competition area, one call will be made so athletes report themselves. This call will be made one hour prior to the event.
- Athletes who do not report on time are subject to disqualification. The Technical Delegate and Meet Director will review extraordinary cases, for example: traffic delays, to permit or deny further participation.
- Athletes will enter the competition zone as follows:

- Athletes who do not comply with the above timeline will be disqualified.
- If an athlete is competing in a field event and is called to a track event, this athlete will be allowed to compete in the track event and then return and complete in the field event without penalization (all pending tries). Recovery times established by IAAF will be respected.
- In the field events, only five athletes advance to the final stage.

5.12. Equipment Specifications

- All the equipment used during the competitions must comply with the weight/size and other IAAF Regulations.
- Athletes will be permitted to use their own equipment (discus, javelin and shot) if they inform
 their delegate and this equipment is presented to the meet organizers 24 hours before the start
 of the Tournament for approval.
- All athletes throughout the event are allowed to use such approved equipment.

5.13. Competition Format

- The event will last three days according to the availability of facilities. Time of rest should be taken into account for athletes who compete in the morning (cross-country) and the afternoon/evening (track) sessions. There must be a minimum of three hours between the ending of one and the beginning of the other.
- In order for athletes to have their best performance and enough rest, the following programming recommendations should be followed:

Important: The host school is entitled to modify this schedule in order to mitigate particular adverse conditions of each host city such as altitude above sea level, heat and humidity, among others, to guarantee safe competition environment for all athletes.

5.14. Officials and Event Personnel

- All judges (officials) must have national or international track and field federation (ITF)
 certification. Local coaches or PE teachers may assist them, but the judges (certified officials)
 will produce results reports NOT the coaches or teachers.
- At least two certified judges (officials) will be in charge of each event.
- The Meet Director, the head official of the entire event, receives all the results and renders them official status for publishing.
- The complete list of meet officials is as follows:
 - Technical Delegate: may be an athletic director or a team head coach. Technical Delegate is also a technical coordinator.
 - Meet Director: head official and coordinator of all the officials. He is the link between the
 officials and Tournament organizing committee. Responsible for confirming all the
 results, rendering them official status and sending them to the Meet Secretary.
 - Call Room official and two to three assistants.
 - Departures official and two to three assistants.
 - Photofinisher and two assistants.
 - Four Stopwatch/Track officials and three assistants.
 - Two officials for each field event and four to five assistants.
 - One Meet Secretary and two assistants: responsible for receiving, reviewing and publishing the results.
 - One or two announcers.

1.11.3. Awards for Track and Field/Cross Country

As of 2017, cross-country is an event within the track and field AASCA Tournament program. Overall Team and Event Awards

- The top three boys and top three girls teams in the overall team standings in each Division will receive a first, second or third place banner and each participant, coach and administrator will receive a medal (\$5 max value). 12 banners will be given out: three for 14 and younger boys Division, three for 14 and younger girls Division, three for 19 and younger boys Division, three for 19 and younger girls Division.
- A certificate of participation will be given out to each athlete, coach, administrator, chaperone and administrative delegate.
- MVPs of each team will receive a medal. Max value \$5. Criteria for choosing will be leadership, teamwork, character, service, passion and dedication. One MVP per category and gender, per school.
- A "Sportsmanship" trophy will be awarded to the winning teams in each category and a medal for each of the trophy winning team member. Four trophies in total.



Individual and Relay Awards

- The top three athletes of each event will receive a medal.
- For the relay races, the top three teams will be rewarded with medals for each of the four runners in each team.

SECTION 6: SWIMMING

The AASCA Swimming Tournament will follow AASCA and the FINA (International Swimming Federation) rules.

6.1. Maximum Number of Swimmers and Entry Fees

- 6 girls and 6 boys per Age Category. (Team Total: 48 Athletes)
- Individual Entry Fee: US\$70 per athlete (If a school enters two or one athlete in the same age category Individual Entry Fee per athlete is paid).
- Category Entry Fee: US\$200. (If a school enters three or more athletes in the same age category Category Entry Fee is paid).

6.2. Pool Dimensions

• 25-meter pool of at least five lanes.

6.3. Age Categories and Divisions

- Eligibility: Athletes in 6th grade, from 11 years old (Must be 11 on the first day of the meet) to 12th grade, 19 years old (Must be younger than 20 on the first day of the meet).
- The age category/Division will be determined by the age of an athlete on the first day of the meet.
- 14 and Younger Division (formed by 2 age categories: 11-12, 13-14) boys and girls.
- 19 and Younger Division (formed by 2 age categories: 15-16, 17-19) boys and girls.

*Scoring Relays: Relays score double points. Four swimmers of the same age category and gender must form a scoring relay (only 1 per School). In an exceptional case when an older age group relay within the same Division is incomplete, (A School has only 3 swimmers in this category) ONE swimmer of the same gender from a younger age category can move up to fill the gap in older category relay. An athlete can swim only in one relay (Cannot compete in a relay of his own age category and then be a supplement swimmer of an older category relay).

6.6. Competition and Scoring System

- AASCA Swimming Tournament is 3 days, 6 sessions (morning and afternoon) competition.
- Preliminary round heats will be held during the morning sessions for all swimmers. According
 to their place in preliminary round, swimmers will qualify to the finals (A or B). Finals A, B and
 Relays are scoring events held in the afternoon sessions. Places 1-3 of the A Finals are
 rewarded with medals. Maximum of three swimmers of the same School can qualify in the
 same event to the finals. The scoring system will depend on the quantity of lanes in the pool as
 follows:

- 4x50 Freestyle Mixed Open Relay does not score, but places 1-3 are awarded with medals.
- 200 meter Freestyle, 200 meter Individual Medley, 100 meter Individual Medley are scoring timed finals events, to be held only during the morning sessions.
- A swimmer can compete in all 7 individual events and 2 relay of his/her age category. (No limit in participation)
- Co-ed relays may be formed as exhibition but will not be scoring.
- For scoring purposes, only the best three times per team will be taken into account.



6.7. Rules and Regulations

- FINA rules for swim strokes, starts and turns will be enforced.
- All swimmers must report to the Call Room at least fifteen minutes prior to their event.
- If a swimmer submits an entry time, this must be his/her recent confirmed official result in this particular event.
- Morning heats will be seeded in accordance with the submitted entry times. (Athletes with faster times are seeded in the latter heats, athletes with slower or no entry times will be seeded in the prior heats).
- Hy-Tek's Meet Manager software is used during the tournament.
- Any challenges to published results and disqualifications must be submitted to the host Athletic Director within 15 minutes of posting.
- Swimwear used by swimmers must be FINA approved.

1.11.4. Awards for Swimming

Team Awards:

• The top three schools in each Division (by the sum of accumulated points) will receive a banner. Total 12 banners are awarded as follows:

Boys 14 and Younger Division Champion, Second Place, Third Place.

Girls 14 and Younger Division Champion, Second Place, Third Place.

Boys 19 and Younger Division Champion, Second Place, Third Place.

Girls 19 and Younger Division Champion, Second Place, Third Place.

• A "Sportsmanship" trophy will be awarded to one team in each Division. (Total 4 trophies). A Sportsmanship medal is also awarded to each Sportsmanship winner team member.

Individual Awards:

- Medals will be awarded for the first, second and third places in each event. (Each swimmer in relays placed 1-3 will receive a medal)
- "Major FINA Points Result Diploma" (1 female and 1 male swimmer per age category Total 8 Diplomas).
- MVPs of each team will receive a medal. Criteria for choosing will be leadership, teamwork, character, service, passion and dedication. One per gender per school.
- A certificate of participation will be given out to each athlete, coaches, administrators, chaperones and administrative de

TALK ABOUT THE INCIDENT THAT OCCURRED DURING THE BOYS VOLLEYBALL FINALS ON APRIL 6 AT EIS.

ADs regretted the way the boys volleyball championship match ended on April 7 at EIS.



It was the third set with EIS winning 15 -14 when a few EIS fans got out of control and threw three water bottles into the direction of where the Village school and its fans where. Fortunately, no one was hit.

The match could not continue. Village stated that there were not the minimum safety conditions for its students to continue with the match.

All EIS fans located in the section that threw the bottles were asked to leave the playing venue by the Event AD Mr. Juan Santamaria. Village was asked to end the game several times but they insisted that in light of his students' safety, they would not come back and play.

In this meeting and after analyzing all the facts that occurred in the match, the ADs came to these conclusions:

- 1. The ADs saw that none of the students playing the championship match did anything wrong that would call for the match to be stopped, and therefore the ADs proposed and voted unanimously to declare both teams as co champions for the 2018-2019 boys volleyball tournament. This proposal will need to be validated by DGs in their May 2019 meeting.
- 2. To form a commission of ADs to analyze the situation further, check the current Manual to see what was not done by the Organizing Committee and what else could be done in order to better ensure the visitors' safety. Come up with suggestions in order to avoid similar problems in the future.

6.2. Responsibilities of the AASCA Host School Administrator in Charge

- For each AASCA event, the general director of the host school should appoint the host school administrator in charge (usually the athletic director or secondary principal).
- The host school administrator in charge will be responsible for:
- Answering all inquiries, questions, protests, etc.
- Handling all disciplinary infractions in consultation with other school administrators.
- Making immediate decisions in case of emergencies.
- Assigning additional administrators if the event takes place in different facilities/locations. An
 administrator must be designated for each venue. They will have the same responsibilities and
 authority as the host school administrator in charge.

From DG's minutes 2015-2016

Proposal: Administrator in charge should not have a dual role. When appropriate, the administrator in charge should be with the spectators, not as a supervisor of the team during the event. Proposal: Administrator in charge is responsible for adherence to the AASCA expectations for parents, students, coaches, and AD's.

Recommendation of GDs, just follow AASCA rules and guidelines as stated in the manuals.

1.10.2. DISCIPLINE AND APPEALS COMMITTEE

MADE UP BY THE HIGH SCHOOL PRINCIPAL OR THE HOST SCHOOL ADMINISTRATOR IN CHARGE AND TWO ADMINISTRATORS IN CHARGE FROM OTHER PARTICIPATING SCHOOLS.

6.2. Responsibilities of the AASCA Host School Administrator in Charge

- For each AASCA event, the general director of the host school should appoint a host school administrator who is a person different than the event director (host AD). The host school administrator could be the General Director, HS Principal, MS Principal or their respective Vice Principals, Dean of Students, or other administrator designee. The appointed administrator may vary from day to day. In any case this person must be available for the whole length of the tournament (day) at all times. [Designee is in the case of multiple sites. I.e. soccer tournaments.]
- The host school administrator will be responsible for, but not limited to:
 - Lead the Discipline and Appeals Committee and whenever needed gather information from court or field delegates, referees and any other ADs or schools' administrators/chaperones in regards to any disciplinary problems that have occurred within or outside the court/field/etc., in relation to game rules and above all in relation to providing a safe environment for all the participating schools (Section 5.2 SECURITY)
 - The host school administrator will oversee the announcement of any decisions of the Appeal and Discipline committee throughout the tournament.
 - Make decisions in case of emergencies.
 - Timely intervention to ensure adherence to AASCA rules
 - Apply sanctions as stated in 1.10.3. Sanctions section
- The event director (host AD) will be responsible for, but not limited to:
 - o Communications with AASCA schools. Manual, Section 3.
 - Assigning court or field delegates for each of the venues.
 - The event director should refrain from openly supporting his teams during the tournament and remain impartial. In other words, the Event Director shall prioritize the



supervision of the event over the supervision of his/her teams. Being close to his/her teams from time to time should not be considered inappropriate.**

- Court or field delegates will be responsible for, but not limited to:
 - The same responsibilities and authority as the event director.
 - o Promote Fair Play at all times as stated in 19.1 of the AASCA Manual.
- Fans and teams are prohibited to use artificial noisemakers such as: drums, trumpets, maracas, whistles, etc.
- Actions of spectators, coaches, or other students that distract the athletes and decrease their performance will not be tolerated. Complete silence must be observed during serves in volleyball, free throws in basketball, and penalty shots in soccer. Referees must ensure adherence as well.
- Athletes, coaches, delegates, and all spectators must use appropriate language.
- Athletes, coaches, delegates, and all spectators must respect the referee's decisions.
- Spectators are not allowed to be behind or near the basket or goal. They may only be in designated spectator areas.
- Spectators and players may not bring country flags onto the premises.

First Offense: Verbal Warning

- A official verbal warning will be given to the team, coach, fans and/or group that commit an
 infraction to the AASCA protocol for the first time. One verbal warning to one of the spectators
 is enough for the rest of spectators for the same school, and one verbal warning to one of the
 players or to the coach is enough for the rest of the team.
- A public announcement will be made at the first stop in play that an official first warning has been issued.

Second Offense

Consequences in case of a Second Offense by the Same Group:

- The offender(s) will be asked to leave the premises.
- A technical foul, red card or equivalent will be applied to the offending team. ** ADs need to review this.
- If the situation continues, the game will be stopped, spectators will leave the premises and the game will continue when a determination is made that the situation is safe for the game to resume
- Any player, coach, or assistant coach, that is ejected from a game, must automatically leave
 the athletic venues and will receive a one game suspension from playing or coaching in the
 next scheduled game. In the case of a spectator, he/she will be removed for the remainder of
 the tournament. The penalties may increase depending on the type of the infraction, and after
 reading the referees report.

II. Discipline and Appeals Committee (DAC). 1.10.2



- 1. The Discipline and Appeals Committee should be formed by the host school administrator, two visiting team administrators and two visiting ADs. These five people will form the official Committee while two others will be called on in case one of the official members cannot perform his/her duties. The seven members of the Committee (five officials and two substitutes) will be introduced during the Technical meeting. They will be also introduced to all participants during the Opening ceremony. The members of the Committee will be chosen by the AD Board.
- 2. The DAC will meet only and exclusively upon receiving a game protest form to review any disciplinary problems that have occurred within or outside the court/field/etc., or in relation to game rules but never to overrule a judgement call.
- 3. The representatives of the schools involved in any of the issues will not participate in the resolution.
- 4. The incident account of the court or field delegates, coaches, visiting ADs, visiting administrators, and the referees will be asked and taken into consideration as necessary.
- 5. All resolutions made by this committee are accepted as final.

SUGGESTIONS FOR DIRECTOR GENERALS

- Avoid scheduling any sports event after Thanksgiving or Semana Santa breaks. REVIEWED AND SUPPORTED
- Avoid scheduling two different AASCA sports events simultaneously in different countries.
 REVIEWED AND SUPPORTED WHEN POSSIBLE.
- Return to past practice for ADs three day meeting. Come back to grant ADs a three days
 meeting to allow them go deeper in each topic and
 again have time for PD (Sportsmanship,
 team development, coaching skills development, etc. REVIEWED AND SUPPORTED
- Avoid scheduling AD meetings right after a sports event. REVIEWED AND SUPPORTED
- 19 out the 23 ADs attending this meeting but CDS (AD hospitalized during the meeting), LIA, Village, and Mazapan, suggest DGs to review again the possibility of coming back to the old format of having split tournaments. These divisions could be according to the number of students in grades 7 to 12 or any other consideration. These are the justifications:
 - A. a. It has been a two-year trial of UNIFIED TOURNAMENTS and the comments of those ADs who have hosted tournaments are not in favor of Unified Tournaments.
 - B. Red financial outcomes, worse than normal.
 - C. Due to the events' cost, dinners have been just snacks that have obligated visiting schools to go for dinner after the closing ceremonies at very late hours.
 - D. Rent of ambulances and facilities have become higher and higher.
 - E. More balls are in need to be purchased which increases the tournament costs.
 - F. More supervisors for venues. The more venues, the more money spent.
 - G. Security of athletes. Teams have to travel longer distances and sometimes insecure places (especially for soccer). Athletes get more tired because of traveling long distances (in Costa Rica 2018 and Panama 2019)



- H. Crowd supervision. Finals (especially) are attended by more and more spectators. The venues can't just accommodate so many fans.
- I. AASCA has grown in number of participants for the last four years and are expected to grow more. It is just very hard and will be extremely hard to host a tournament of near 40 teams and more than 100 matches in just three days.
- J. AASCA is the only organization around the world with so many participating schools that has no divisions at the moment.
- K. Due to the monopoly of airlines in Central America, during AASCA sports events, it is common now that airfare tickets get more expensive resulting in some teams traveling the day before/after leading to a more expensive budget for families with increased hotel costs and missing more instructional days. AASCA says that only three days should be permitted to miss due to any AASCA event.
- L. Not enough quality referees.
- M. Although not always, usually the large schools beat the small schools. Stats show that the majority of matches have been won by large schools. Parents (and students) would like to have the same chances to win matches and eventually win tournaments. Parents would not like to be investing \$1000 just to have a great time a make friends.
- N. Small schools who normally have in their rosters students in grades 7 and 8 are in jeopardy of injuries by playing against students from large schools, normally grades 10, 11 and 12th who are stronger, taller, faster, etc.
- O. Inauguration and closing ceremonies demand more space and not all of the hosting schools have that.
- P. There are some cities that will never have the chance to host a tournament again, like La Ceiba, because of the small number of hotels there.
- Q. Small schools will have little chance to host UNIFIED tournaments since they do not have the needed infrastructure. REVIEWED AND SUPPORT THE NEED FOR DIVISION. SEE PROPOSAL PRESENTED BY PRINCIPALS.

AASCA Athletic Directors:

Below are some reasons why I believe AASCA Tournaments in individual sports like Track and Field and Swimming should be contested in narrow age groups, and why 11-year-old 6th grade students should be included.



John Tauer is a psychology professor at the University of St. Thomas, in St. Paul, Minn., where he studies competition and coaches the men's basketball team. This is what he says about kid's competitions (He talks about younger kids of 7-9 years old): "When I hear solutions that say let's eliminate kids' competition, that's not realistic."

"One of the biggest culprits in psychology is wanting kids to feel good all the time," Dr. Tauer said. "Trying to avoid competition is making it bigger than it needs to be."

- 1. The desire to compete and to win is commonly known and natural and kids from the early age seek the opportunities to compete with each other. At 11 years old, the age when such physical qualities as speed, flexibility and agility are in their period of fastest improvement (Sensitive period), simplest competitions as who jumps higher or farther, runs or swims or rides a bike faster, etc. become very popular and often kids organize such races spontaneously, without coaches' supervision. I have witnessed this uncountable times during my swim coach career. The most exciting part of the workout was always the one that included a competitive twist. This becomes more evident with teens, because at 11 kids are psychologically ready to accept the loss and they acknowledge that it is as normal and acceptable to lose as to win. The exposure to competition, where loss is more common than a win, becomes necessary for healthy psychological maturation and formation of a balanced, respectful and empathic character.
- 2. Since Swimming and Athletics are pretty simple sports technically (kids as young as seven can demonstrate perfect swim strokes or impeccable running/jumping technique), the result depends mostly on physical qualities (Strength, Endurance), which improve exponentially with the onset of puberty. We all know that in this sense (Hormonally) the difference between 12 and 14 year olds can be huge, especially among boys. It's absolutely wrong to merge the 11-12 and 13-14 age categories into one like 11-14, simply because we leave no chance for younger guys of the category to succeed. (Please check the enormous difference in US National Age Group records between 11-12 and 13-14 age groups in swimming and running for reference).
- 3. To give an opportunity for 12-year-olds to participate, but to limit participation to seventh graders and older, are two contradictory (if not mutually excluding) conditions. If you analyze the birthday data of 6th and 7th graders you'll find out that there are many more 12 year olds in the 6th grade than in the 7th grade, especially towards the end of a school year. (In ANS case, updating the ages of students to 29.03.2019 I found 16 students still 12 in 7th grade, but 29 students that are already 12 in 6th grade). As a solution, to include 6th graders in individual sports, but at the same time, to open the youngest age category for 11 years old kids, to make it an 11-12 years old age group, seems the most logical and correct.



- 4. Based on my experience of four AASCA Swimming Tournaments, where 11 years old 6th graders were still allowed to participate, I can claim that these kids were the most manageable group, causing no problems whatsoever. They also were the ones that were most eager to compete and to continue in the sport after the Tournament.
- 5. To conclude, because of the limitations mentioned above, were imposed in 2018 on individual sports; we witnessed this phenomenon in AASCA swimming Tournament this year: The 12 years old age group was almost empty with 3 girls and 2 boys! This is despite the fact that in previous AASCA Swimming tournaments, when this age group was 11-12, and 6th graders were allowed to participate, it was the most populous and most competitive.

Now, please consider this:

- 1. Are we doing the right thing by limiting participation and shutting down on opportunities?
- 2. Are we motivating younger kids to take up swimming and track and field?
- 3. Will this decision to limit participation simply because we "should comply with AASCA Regulations" lead us to have more kids participating and competing in Athletics and Swimming?
- 4. Will less kids practicing help us raise the level and quality of our program?
- 5. Could we be losing talented athletes on the way by limiting participation?

Thursday, April 25, 2019

2018 minutes were approved unanimously

Local ADs attending the general conference - clarification of policy.



Principals are proposing that the AD of the school hosting the AASCA Principal's meeting attend the first day of principals' conference to clarify any questions/doubts. - APPROVED * add moved/seconded

MS Sports Festival - for discussion

CAG - middle school students were not interested in participating

PAS - suggests an awards system and MVP (added to the manual) along with a rubric for said awards. Timeline for registration needs to be extended. ADs need to complete and submit all required information as per the timelines established by the host school.

ALL COACHES that accompany teams **MUST** be present for the entire festival. In situations where this does not happen, the General Director of the home school will be contacted immediately.

<u>Proposal</u> - students and coaches will select, based on a rubric (specific values), their sportsmanship MVP per team. Ricardo will share AST's rubric used in 2017. One overall sportsmanship team will be identified by the referees and official school administrator in charge.

Coaches are responsible for keeping their teams **together at all times**.

Items from last year's meeting

EAS - schools need to have their own insurance when traveling and competing in AASCA events.

The manual needs to updated to reflect that the decision that each participating school must assume financial responsibilities related to medical issues for their own students.

MS Science Fair -

CAG - could the science fair be expanded to include grades 6-8? Or maybe a separate event?

<u>Proposal</u> - To expand the AASCA Science Fair to include grades 6 - 8. APPROVED

PD discussion

Village - it is hard to get good PD. Can a youtube channel be created to establish a PD network?

Hudak volunteers to create a calendar where we all can share our PD opportunities/expertise. Discussion board along with policies or any other areas that may be useful to schools across the region. The calendar can be linked to the AASCA web page.

Community service award submission - Balboa School and ISP were selected.



UNIFIED TOURNAMENTS - ADs are recommending to return to small and large schools tournaments as opposed to unified tournaments.

Eric - schools should not be labeled as small or large schools - school should be able to move back and forth. Based on previous year's placement (basketball, volleyball, and soccer) School numbers need to be revised every 2 years. There needs to be some kind of flexibility to move.

Proposal for volleyball, basketball, and soccer (all others remain unified) -

- Divisions will be determined based on performance and enrollment
- Schools should be allowed to declare/petition where they want to play (based on statistics and enrollment) per sport and gender. Petitions should be done during this time of the year (after volleyball).
- 2 year review of enrollment numbers.
- Change the name of the divisions other than large and small schools or any numerical, etc. ranking, etc.
- ADs need to come up with clear process and protocols to petition and well established criteria to make a determination.
- ADs need to provide data in order to make and support future decisions.
- ADs will determine the max number of participants per tournament
- Schools petitioning will present data from last four years of competition to inform status that will determine the divisions.

LIVE STREAMING IN AASCA SPORTS EVENTS -

ADs propose that live streaming is optional - APPROVED

Swimming, tennis, and track and field - age and grade

<u>Proposal</u> - That eligibility includes 6th grade and a minimum of 11 years old the day of the tournament.

REGISTRATION - ADs are proposing a standard registration procedure - APPROVED <u>Addendum</u> - MS Sports Festival registration was not completed accurately by all schools as outlined in the manual.

*Fee for MS Sport Festival \$700 is already included in the manual

AWARDS -

If we remain unified then the AD proposal is APPROVED



If the proposal presented by the principal's group is accepted then it is to be a 1st, 2nd, and 3rd award system

SCHEDULING OF EVENTS

ADs are proposing events not to be scheduled after Thanksgiving and Semana Santa - will be discussed later with the calendar

ADs are recommending not to schedule simultaneous events - will be discussed when making the calendar

SUMMARY

Balboa Academy was honored to host the AASCA Middle Conference 18-20 October 2018. The conference was open to all AASCA schools and we were pleased to see that a total of 12 schools sent 126 student leaders and 22 chaperones. Our theme, "A World of Opportunities" was the catalyst for activities that focused on teaching students how to establish meaningful connections and realize their potential by examining their values to make deliberate and thoughtful decisions. Students also learned about balancing the responsibilities they decide to take on and how to conduct efficient and effective meetings. Our keynote speaker, Mrs. Ilya Espino de Marotta (one of Forbes' 50 most powerful women in Central America), gave a great opening as she discussed the traits one needs in order to be successful, both in their personal and professional life.

Balboa Academy student council members greeted the schools on the first day with a warm welcome and took a very active role in each day's activities by leading the students throughout the campus and making sure that the schedule of events were adhered to. On the first day, the Balboa Academy students provided the visiting schools with their name tag, T-Shirts, a folder with the schedule of events and locations for each activity, and assisted in the ice breaker activities.

On day two it was an early start as students boarded the Panama Canal Railway as the train travelled through our diverse eco-system. It was a wonderful opportunity for these students to visit the third set of locks (Agua Clara). This visit gave the students a better understanding of the challenges and achievements made to accomplish this project. After returning to campus students participated in more engaging workshops (Power of Connections, Go for the Extraordinary, Rules of Order; and are we making Healthy Choices).



The last day students worked on their Action Plan/SMART goals presentation. Each school was given 3-5 minutes to present their action plan and it was enlightening that the presentations included many of the elements they learned during the conference (leadership role, team building, communication). Students will be returning to their school with action plans ranging from improving their cafeterias by eliminating plastic; fundraising activities to support service projects; improving student activities to name a few. For the closing ceremony schools were given a certificate of participation.




- Choir needs full time, experienced, separate accompanist that is not associated with any of the participating schools
- AASCA events manual dictates that participants should be from 7th-12th grade
 - This should be added to the AASCA music handbook
 - This corresponds to the required ability to perform music at a level of 2.5+
- The guest conductor commented that the experience felt slanted towards band and made the following suggestions:
 - All rehearsal spaces should be centrally located
 - All large ensembles should be roughly the same size
 - o There should be an equal amount of vocal and instrumental ensembles
 - I.e. Concert band, jazz band : Choir, chamber choir
 - School should try to ensure equal ensemble opportunities as much as possible
- All students should arrive thoroughly knowing the repertoire
- Repertoire should be announced and shared with all participants and guest conductors as soon as possible into the school year
- More detailed communication needed earlier with Guest Conductores
- All repertoire should be available for ePrint for ease of purchase
 - SmartMusic is another great option if all schools can use this.
 - Clarification of copyright law and educational fair use. Please clarify:
 - One purchase per ensemble
 - One purchase per institution
- Customized music workshops should be available to all instruments and vocal parts
- Participating students, teachers, and volunteers should follow rules of etiquette in the Performing Arts Center
- Assure that all performer have access to water during the festival

Concerns and Suggestions Relating to Adjudication and Competition


- Many schools were upset that that the solo and ensemble portion was non-competitive as prizes have been handed out in the past
- Many schools were frustrated that large ensemble, instrumental, and vocal solos happened simultaneously
 - To have these presented on stage to all participants would require less ensemble rehearsal time during the festival and more preparation done by each school prior to arrival
- Festival Requirements if this is to be competitive:
 - All participating schools must agree and change the AASCA Music Festival Handbook
 - The host must use outside and impartial, professional adjudicators
 - All participants to submit entries and scores a month before
 - This will facilitate finding the correct specialist adjudicators



- Without scores (sheet music), adjudicators cannot evaluate students on how well they follow the music and the judging becomes much more subjective
- It has been suggested that selections should not be performed with a backing track and should not be from the popular genre
- Adjudicators must meet with facilitators and agree upon scoring criteria, use of numbers, etc, before the event
- All adjudicators must be given recording devices to record comments during each performance, as per AASCA Music Handbook, and recordings must be distributed to directors after the event
- Music Education and Ensemble opportunities must be implemented equally in all AASCA schools before considering competition
 - All middle school and high school students must be able to enroll in band, choir, and/or orchestra every semester
 - All ensembles must meet as a full group as the regular rehearsal
 - Ensemble electives must not be scheduled at the same time as one-section core academic classes










Participant Behavior during the event

The commendations gathered from the survey included comments on:

- the smooth running of the tournament.
- communication.
- the high quality of the medals, trophies and banners.

Recommendations:

The recommendations gathered from the survey included comments on:

- the distance between the different game venues making it difficult to move from place to place.
- the safety of tents at one of the external venues.
- coolers and ice for drinks to be provided to teams at all game venues rather than just hydration.
- Student ice breakers could have been explained better and they were too short.

As the host school we would also recommend the following AASCA/Soccer rules be discussed at the upcoming Athletic Directors meeting:

AASCA Soccer rules state that extra time (2 halves of 8 minutes) will be played in case of a tie
in top four (final / 3rd place / semi finals) games of the Gold Tournament. This happened in
three occasions, all of which then went on to penalties. Given the physical strain of playing
many games in 3 days and the logistics of potential game delays, we would recommend
removing extra time and going straight to penalties in these matches.



- AASCA Soccer rules state that there will be a three minute water break in games played between 10:00 a.m. and 2:00 p.m. On the final day of games a number of athletic directors requested additional water breaks during the games beginning at 3:30 p.m. and 5:00 p.m. This did cause some tension with games in motion in six different venues throughout the city at the same time. We would recommend a revision of this rule should it be felt that more water breaks are needed. From a logistical perspective, we would urge caution with adding more rules which will extend game lengths. We already have a rule stating a 3 hour minimum rest time between games and in soccer there are now no games starting between 12:00 noon 2:00 p.m. With the size of AASCA tournaments, these rules will result in more game venues needed and thus more costs (referees / ambulances / field rentals...) for the host school.
- AASCA Soccer rules state that goal average (goals scored DIVIDED by goals conceded) is used in tie breakers. In the 1970s FIFA moved away from using goal average to use goal difference instead (goals scored MINUS goals conceded). We would recommend AASCA does the same for 2020. There is also the danger that goal average does not work when a team has '0' in their 'goals for' or 'goals against' column (since '0' is not divisible). In AASCA tournaments, sometimes there are groups of different numbers of teams (some of 3 and others of 4). In these cases we suggest using 'average goal difference' (goals scored minus goals conceded, divided by number of games played).
- In the last 5 AASCA team tournaments (Basketball in Guatemala '17 and Costa Rica '18 / Volleyball in Honduras '18 and Soccer in Costa Rica '18 and Panama '19) host schools have been 'live-streaming' games from their campus. AASCA Soccer in Panama had over 20,000 views from all over the world via the live streaming. Live streaming is not mentioned in the AASCA handbook but is becoming a norm. This was a considerable expense for us and we would recommend discussion on whether this should become a rule or not and whether registrations fees in turn need to be increased.
- The scale of hosting AASCA Soccer in it's Unified version is a stretch on any of the AASCA schools. We are aware there has been much discussion on whether AASCA should remain unified or whether to split. Going back to two separate tournaments makes sense from the athletic, logistical and financial perspectives as was shared by the Athletic Directors in detail last year.


